### Parish Council Update

The recent Parish Council Meeting on March 20th discussed a number of issues which we want the community to be aware of, as we move forward under the direction of Fr Hans.

1. There is a need to update the Parish Census. This process began last Sunday and will continue in the weeks ahead. Ian, the Chair of the Parish Council, will ask those who believe they are not on the parish census to give their details to Sharon at the end of Mass. A good number of people did so last Sunday. If you are new to the parish, you are very welcome and we would like you to make yourself known.

2. The parish website needs to be updated and work has begun to build a new site that is relevant and useful to all members of our community. We hope to have this work completed in the coming months.

3. The Parish Hall is in urgent need of repair. We agreed there needs to be a short term and a longer-term plan to renovate the Hall which is a valuable asset for our community and others who wish to use it. There are repairs which need to begin immediately and the approximate cost will be around £9,000. After Easter there will be a Second Collection to raise funds for the repairs. The date will be given later. We know how generous you are and know your response will be of great help.

4. The Finances of the parish would benefit from Planned Giving (Envelopes) and Standing Orders. Planned Giving allows the Parish to claim from HMRC, 25% of what is given. More on this later.

5. After Easter, Fr Hans will give a talk on the 'Syro-Malabar' Rite. Every Sunday, large numbers of parishioners from Kerala celebrate Mass (Qurbana) in the Syro-Malabar Rite which is very different from the Latin Rite which is celebrated at the 10.30 Mass. The Syro Malabar liturgy is ancient, dating back to the early days of the Church so it would be good for all of us to understand its history and development. The talk will be accompanied by food and soft drinks. Date to be announced, but it will be a Wednesday evening.

6. We recognise the need for the parish to grow and mature. Our aim is to encourage a strong faith in our younger people through worship, Family Life and Peer support. Plans are being developed through the Diocesan Outreach Service.


7. An International Mass will be celebrated on September 29<sup>th</sup>.

## Background on the Gospel Reading John 20:19-31.

Thomas believes because he sees Jesus.

Today's reading from the Gospel of John is proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Easter in each of the lectionary cycles. This fact alone should alert us to the significance of the encounters with the resurrected Jesus that are described in this reading. This Gospel combines two scenes: Jesus' appearance to his disciples after his Resurrection and Jesus' dialogue with Thomas, the disciple who doubted.

Part of the mystery of Jesus' Resurrection is that he appeared to his disciples not as a spirit, but in bodily form. We do not know, however, exactly what this form looked like. Earlier in John's Gospel, when Mary of Magdala first encountered the risen Jesus, she did not recognize him until he spoke to her. In Luke's Gospel, the disciples walking along the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus until he broke bread with them. We know from readings such as today's that in his resurrected form, Jesus was not bound by matter; he appeared to the disciples inside a home even though the door was locked. Yet the disciples could still touch the marks of his Crucifixion.

In today's Gospel, Jesus greets his disciples with the gift of peace. Jesus then commissions his disciples to continue the work that he has begun; as Jesus was sent by God, so Jesus sends his disciples. He gives his disciples the gift of the Holy Spirit so that they will be able to accomplish this task. Jesus' words to his disciples also highlight the integral connection between the forgiveness of sins and the gift of the Holy Spirit. With the grace of the Holy Spirit, we can share forgiveness and reconciliation with others.

Thomas, the doubting disciple in today's reading, represents the reality of the Church that comes after this first community of witnesses to Jesus. All but the first disciples of Jesus must believe without seeing. Like Thomas, we may doubt the news that Jesus, who was crucified and buried, appeared to his disciples. Our human nature seeks hard evidence that the Jesus who appeared to his disciples after his death is indeed the same Jesus who was crucified. Thomas is given the opportunity to be our representative in obtaining this evidence. He gives witness to us that the Jesus who was raised is the same Jesus who died. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit, we are among those who are blessed, for we have not seen and yet believe.

**WORDS OF THE HOLY FATHER**. In the redeeming contact with the wounds of the Risen One, Thomas showed his own wounds, his own injuries, his own lacerations, his own humiliation; in the print of the nails, he found the decisive proof that he was loved, that he was expected, that he was understood. He found himself before the Messiah filled with kindness, mercy, tenderness. This was the Lord he was searching for, he, in the hidden depths of his being, for he had always known He was like this. And how many of us are searching deep in our heart to meet Jesus, just as He is: kind, merciful, tender! For we know, deep down, that He is like this. Having rediscovered personal contact with Christ who is amiable and mercifully patient, Thomas understood the profound significance of his Resurrection and, intimately transformed, he declared his full and total faith in Him exclaiming: "My Lord and my God!" (v. 28). Beautiful, Thomas' expression is beautiful!
